RACHEL ROVAY Profile, 257 Coventry Street, South Melbourne. March 31 - April 14.

It was with trepidation I undertook the assignment of another gallery review.


Disillusioned with the often stagnant and impotent works of recent exhibitions, I was growing increasingly sceptical as to the direction and validity of much contemporary art.

For this reason I was appreciative of the fortuitous timing of Rachel Rovay's exhibition which commenced this week at Profile Gallery.

Ms Rovay, an Israeli-born Melbourne artist, in this exhibition addresses the conflict wrought in her homeland.

The 10 oil-on-canvas paintings and seven chalkpastel drawings are evocative in content and masterful in depiction.

Although largely expressionist in technique, it is apparent the artist has employed facets from varying artistic styles.

in exhibit eight, untitled, is bold reminiscent of Klimt, while 'fauve' the format in a number of colour is evident in a paintings appears as a direct parallel to Fuernica.

Rovay's portraval directs the viewer to the horror and pathos inflicted upon the lives of ordinary citizens.

Figures linger in dark

doorways, others are observed as if caged indoors, clutching in an embrace or standing alone, frightened and eves bewildered, staring from windows.

Glimpses of domestic order do exist (a vase of flowers) but appear vulnerable and transitory, as insidious fingers of flame threaten to devour.

Exhibit number five, untitled, indicates a significant shift in depicting suffering humanity.

Here human carnage is objectified, kitchen utensils having replaced stylised figures.

This motif is more fully explored in the drawings which have a more surreal quality than do the paintings.

These works evoke a different mood and feel also: a more ordered and subdued depiction devoid of the elements of destruction and chaos.

The drawings in particular are bold, dynamic and strangely broody, and should not be seen as a mere adjunct to the painting.

The exhibition is a powerful and sensitive portraval of life in contemporary Israel, and should not be missed.
